MODEL 4 CP/M (Montezuma Micro):

If you are using Wordstar Word Processor on your Model 4/4P (with CP/M), then it becomes necessary to install "Wordstar" using the ADM-3A Terminal setup. This will allow you the Printer output addresses necessary to print your files.

1000 HD FUNCTION KEYS?

Tandy rearranged the on-key assignments in G.W. BASIC so that the 1000 HD would be more compatible with IBM BASIC. F 11 & F12, which were 11-22 in the 1000 BASIC are now 21 & 22. The arrow keys are now 11 thru 14. Now, should you need more help in finding out how close Tandy is to being an IBM Clone, see the PC/M Magazine Sept. '86 issue at the next meeting.

UPPERCASE BOOT-UP:

Should you desire your Model 4 to boot-up in UPPERCASE letters, install this patch in TRSDOS 6.2.X:

```
PATCH SYSO/SYS.LSI DOS:0  
(D00,80=20:F00,80=00)
```

This patches the disk file. Should you need this patch and help in putting it into DOS, ask at the meeting. This is not a required DOS patch; but should you desire your machine to come on line with capital letters, use it.

ERROR CODES:

The Sept. '86 issue of "80 Micro" has a complete listing of the ERROR Codes and an explanation of each code. I would suggest you obtain this issue for your files.

I don't believe a more extensive code explanation exists. The Chart of Page 56 is invaluable.

CLONE (MS-DOS) CHEAPEST & BEST:

Should you be thinking about which MS-DOS Clone is better to buy, pick up the October '86 issue of PC Magazine. 18 low cost MS-DOS Clones were tested and compared for reliability, workmanship, and hardware. The worst and the best are evaluated. I have the book at the house. I think this Shopping Guide is the best guide to buying that you could use. Check it out before you decide to buy a MS-DOS Clone.

PRINTER DRIVER:

Radio Shack has issued a Printer up-grade Catalog #700-2294 which is called "Printer Drivers for SuperSCRIPSIT". This supports the DWP-220 Printer. The Patches leave out the old Model 1 Computer. There are Patches that do work "DWP-410/CTL File". Type in the Program Listing and Save it as "PATCH/BAS". To alter DWP-410/CTL for the 210 Printer, simply MERGE these lines to the Patch Program and Run it.

610 DATA 00,13,01,0A
620 DATA 00,33,01,0E
630 DATA 00,3D,01,0E

If you have a copy of DWP220/CTL File on your Model 1, MERGE these lines to the Patch Program above and then Run it.

CRT AND YOUR VISION:

Did you know that the CRT will not harm your eyesight? Did you know that poor posture, improper seating, and your own personal habits are the culprits? Yes, after listening to a very well spoken Doctor of Optometry explain why and how you damage your vision, I think I'll try a few of his recommended suggestions. In his field of business, dealing with workers and their work stations, he recommends that you exercise your eyes about every 15 minutes. For those who wear glasses, he suggests you tell your optometrist of your work environment and obtain 1 pair of glasses especially for that application. Standard eye exams and standard glasses are not designed for work station applications and you therefore strain your eyes and stress your nerves. The man makes good sense. I'll have some of his literature available at the meetings so you can check it out further. The eyes you mess up are yours. The name of this service is called "behaviorial optometry" and the services are called "visual therapy". Ask your family optometrist about these services.

I have a sales copy of the "Accounting Program" for those with MS-DOS World Computers. Should you desire to have a cheap, but well oriented Accounting System, check this Program out and buy whatever Modules you need. They are advertised in "80 Micro" also.

PACKET RADIO B.B.S.:

By the time you receive this Newsletter we should have the Amateur Radio "Packet Radio (2 meter) Module" up and operating on the Club B.B.S. What does that mean? Well, you can observe the HAM Radio Computer linked Bulletin Board System live as it operates between Club members. The Packet System will

not allow you transmission to the B.B.S. but should you wish to, you and any qualified Ham Operator could exchange info. The boundaries of our set up are not final, but we think it has future merits. Call the Club B.B.S. (408/374-3974) and see the two worlds of communications working together.

SAN JOSE PUBLIC LIBRARY FREE ELECTRONIC B.B.S.:

The Silicon Valley Information Center located at the San Jose Public Library presents an on-line Catalog Index of Materials, including newspaper clippings, etc. and it is available 24 hours per day. This is a FREE Electronic B.B.S. Service to assist you in finding information at the Library in San Jose. The telephone number is 408/277-5758. The Password "PUBLIC" is the proper one for Log-On Procedures (although they don't list TRS-80's). Just set your machine up and call in. This is a fantastic way to eliminate parking in downtown San Jose.

GORILLA BANANA PRINTER:

Descender ROM Kit: It improves the character set and has full descending characters. Easy to install. Before ordering, open the printer and look back to the long controller chip. Note in front of it if it is a FONT ROM chip. Write down the ID Number. Order 4AB0 if 3AL1 Descender ROM with the same ROM numbers. Cost is \$19.96. Order from E. through Dial-up Access

The Silicon Valley Information Center is located on the third floor of the San Jose Public Library. The S.V.I.C. Online Catalog can be accessed from sites outside the Main Library building with a microcomputer, modem and appropriate communications software. The Online Catalog indexes all materials, including newspaper clippings, housed in the Center, and is available for online access 24 hours per day.

EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS:

DEC VT-100 data terminal

or

Microcomputer system (IBM PC/XT/XT, APPLE IIE/MACINTOSH, etc.) including:

Modem (300 or 1200 baud)

Communications software (CrossTalk, Smartcom, Framework, Mirror or other software capable of emulating DEC VT-100 data terminal)

The terminal settings should be:

Speed: 300 or 1200 Parity: None Duplex: Full
Data bits: 8 Stop bits: 2 Emulate: VT-100
Answerback: Off

1. Dial (408) 277-5758
2. After connection is established, press RETURN <CR>
3. When prompted with "Logon please:" type PUBLIC <CR> *
* MUST be in upper case.
4. Once the display shown below appears, follow the instructions provided by the system. If you need assistance, call the Silicon Valley Information Center at (408) 277-5754. The Center's hours are:

Our club has obtained FAME nationally-internationally-as well as locally. This in itself is an HONOR for all of us. Our HELP to others is well known throughout the world.





