EXPANDED HORIZONS

Have I got news for you? If you run a Model I,III,4 eternal memory is within your grasp.

Thanks to ALPHA PRODUCTS INC., my Model 4 now has 512K of memory! If you are as attached to the Model 4 as I am, you cannot afford to overlook this. The multiplicity of functions of the Model 4, its sturdiness and reliability make it a machine that earns affection and esteem. Now with 512K it can sneer at IBMs. Well, some IBMs, and a lot of other Johnny-come-latelys as well.

Most of our best magazines carry advertisements of the Alpha Products Inc. line. As with most of you Tandy devotees, following "what's new" is my favorite pastime. Occasionally I succumb to that special ad for hardware which promises to change my computer into what it never was (but I wish it was). Supermen delivers! Those of you who know me, know that I won't speak well of the dead (products), nor will I keep quiet about being ripped off just so I can get some company. I have given caveats for many products in the past-- such as Omikron, Holmes, Remex, Priority-One and even Radio Shack when they deserved it. This product and this company are genuine. Not only does it work, but the firm sent along a new adapter when the original arrived damaged BY NEXT DAY AIR.

The modification requires that each memory I.C. location be fitted with the 41256 (256K RAM I.C., 16 total), and that a capacitor at each such location be removed. The adaptor board is plugged into the CPU socket on the computer's main PC board. Ground, +5 volt and control wire leads (from the adapter board) are tack-soldered to ICs also located on the main board. A plug attached by flat lead to the adapter board plugs into the U72 socket, replacing the PAL IC. This completes the physical modification. Yours truly is available to accomplish this modification for the non-hardware type computerist.

The sweetest part of the operation was initializing the system using the familiar NEWDOS80 system and the SUPERDISK software. The disk programs are transferred to your own system disk, and tailoring takes care of the balance of the customizing. A BASIC program (Sample/Bas) actually initializes the system to accommodate the memory (except the lowest 64K of RAM) to perform as a RANDISK. Upon running "Sample/Bas" the screen asks "Drive number to be assigned to RANDISK?". I use "2", and the configuration continues. Next a prompt suggests entering 'DO RANDISK1 for original configuration or 'DO RANDISK2 for reconfiguration'. When one enters "DO RANDISK1" the RAM memory is formatted as a disk, is verified and Systems are initialized. Finally the RANDISK is assigned as drive 0 and the original zero drive is reassigned (in this case) as drive 2. Now if one copies programs to the RANDISK

area, the normal copy command from drive 2 to zero will send programs into the RANDISK area of your 512K memory. The original drive 0 is available for things other than DOS because DOS is in RANDISK now.

You can even do a reset (as long as you do not hold the reset key down more than an instant) and the RANDISK area will remain intact! To reinitialize enter 'DO RANDISK2' and you are back in business. It is impressive, even startling, to do a DIR and have a disk catalog appear without a drive starting up!

I will be commenting further on SUPERMEN as it is put to greater use, and when it has been expanded to its full 1.024 megabyte capacity.

Should the craving for more memory (just so you'll know, it's similar to the craving for chocolate) wake you in the early morning hours, just call me. I will be compassionate (as long as you don't call me in the early morning hours).

We have \$900.00 to replace the stolen BBS hardware. We also have \$300.00 in the SBUG-80 repairs account.

The assets in the original system which could be reused are:

- 1. Disk Drive case and Power Supply.**
- 2. Old worn cables.**

The assets NOW in use for the system, other than the above, belong to Eric Brewer, and Gerald F. Mc Kee, and should be returned (or purchased from owners).

We are still in the process of analysing to see what system will suit us best, financially and technically. Could a Model I system still do? Would a Model 4 be better? Would it serve us to get an MSDOS based clone?

The MSDOS alternatives are listed---sketchily---below.

1. The R/S Model 1000, augmented with full memory (640 K), 80 TK DS drives, RS-232, Printer, and a new 1200 baud modem.-----discarded as design does not permit expansion because the only cards available do not fit within the case, as designed! (Would have cost approx \$1850.00)

2. The R/S Model 1200 HD, augmented with full memory (640 K), RS-232, Printer and a new 1200 baud modem.-----discarded for same reason as above! (Would have cost approx \$2300.00).

3. The R/S Model 2000 augmented to full memory (760 K), 80 TK DS drives, Printer and new 1200 baud modem.-----discarded because it is not compatible with MS/DOS used by 1000/1200 or IBM PC! (Would have cost approx \$2500.00)

4. A clone kit, with full memory (512 K), RS-232, 80 TK DS drives and HD, Printer, and a new 1200 baud modem. ----selected as the only fully compatible MS/DOS fully supported system other than an IBM PC. Further it is the least expensive of the MSDOW options. (Should cost approx \$2150.00)

The parts breakdown was figured on the following price estimates:

RS-232 \$80.00

80 TK DS drive \$80.00 ea

Hard Disk (10MB) and controller complete \$500.00

Memory augmentation, 256 K \$55.00 ea
Printer \$250.00
1200 baud modem \$275.00
Complete PC clone \$600.00

Main PC stuffed, 135 Watt PS, B & W Monitor, Parallel Board, Floppy disk controller board, keyboard, case, DS 80 TK drive, cables included. The minimum system initially procured is to include a drive, stuffed clone (128 K), printer, RS-232, modem, monitor and BBS Software. Procurement of additional memory, Hard disk Drive, and more floppy drives would be deferred until funds become available for their addition.

It is assumed that Commercial Bulletin Board Software is available and will be running in MS/DOS, in such a manner as to be fully compatible with any SBUG Members Tandy/RS/MSDOS system. It is further understood that should any total package purchase require additional financing, then the excess cost must first be approved by a vote of the membership.

We are looking for, and believe that we can encounter means to avoid any costs beyond the cash in hand.

EDITOR'S NOTE: In the past, SBUG80, (the bulletin board), and SBUG were separate entities that functioned side by side. The current idea is to make them one. This should also be discussed at a general meeting.

CUT THOSE HIGH TELEPHONE BILLS

From "NORTHERN BYTES"

This almost sounds like one of those "Good News-Bad News" jokes. The good news is that you can limit your monthly bill for computer-to-computer calls to \$25.00 a month, no matter how many calls you make. The bad news is that at present, you can only do this if you live in one of twelve major U.S. cities! Hopefully, this service will expand to cover more areas of the country in the not too distant future. (With my luck it will probably get into Sault Ste. Marie in about the year 2025.....) Don't go away if you don't live in one of the twelve major cities, because I'm going to reveal a little-known way that you can make use of this service to cut your long distance phone bills even if you don't live in one of those major cities. It will only be cost effective if you do a lot of telecommunicating, but for some of you it could be an interim solution to those high bills (particularly if you live fairly close to one of the twelve major cities).

But first, more about the service itself. It is called PC PURSUIT and is being offered by GTE Telenet, and they have established a free-access bulletin board that you can dial up for more information. The BBS number is (800) 835-3001. The following information was downloaded from that BBS, and should give you a little better idea of what is being

offered. Thanks to George Matyaszek, SYSOP of the Chicago Green Machine BBS (this BBS phone number is (312) 622-4442) for tipping me off to this service.

IN PURSUIT OF ALMOST ANYTHING!

For just \$25 a month, you can establish an unlimited number of connections to free telephone-accessible databases, bulletin boards and other communicating PCs in 12 major metropolitan areas. The PC PURSUIT service can save you up to 75% over long distance telephone charges for your home PC. It's the first cost effective alternative for home PC users who have been using standard public telephone services to make long distance connections.

With PC PURSUIT, you can explore a wealth of free resources, and even discover more uses for your PC. In any of the locations accessible to PC PURSUIT, you have the ability to:

- \$ Call and send real-time information to other communicating PCs.
- \$ Access public bulletin boards to exchange messages. (GTE Telenet is not associated with these bulletin boards or their services).
- \$ Access free databases for information that can be entertaining and educational.
- \$ Download/upload public domain software
- \$ Shop and advertise in electronic catalogs.

SERVICE HOURS AND BILLING

The PC PURSUIT service is provided from 6 PM to 7 AM Monday through Friday and on weekends from 6 PM Friday to 7 AM Monday (local time).

The more you use the service, the more cost efficient it becomes!

A PC PURSUIT subscription includes a one-time registration fee of just \$25. Then you pay a flat monthly fee of \$25 for virtually unlimited use of the service. Each connection can last 60 minutes. You are billed monthly through your VISA or MASTERCARD account. Payment by check is also offered--if you would like to pay by check call (800) 368-4215.

EQUIPMENT REQUIRED

To use PC PURSUIT all you need are --:

- a telephone line.
- an auto answer modem (300 or 1200 bps)
- a terminal or PC with asynchronous communications software.

DYNAMIC MEMORIES EDITOR'S note: NORTHERN BYTES is a TANDY I, III, 4, newsletter associated with THE ALTERNATE SOURCE. It is always informative and worth reading. Jack Decker is a hacker of the old school. (That means he's over thirty). I can hear the tumblers falling into place in the vault of the collective SBUG mind. PC PURSUIT could really offer

us something if we are inventive and aggressive. If there is a club interest, I will pursue PC PURSUIT to see what's in it for us.

Since the Steering Committee or the Membership at large has never requested, insisted on, or even mentioned wanting a full accounting or even an accounting of assets, we can assume that there are no assets to account for. It is my understanding that there is two separate entities: SBUG and SBUG-80. SBUG-80 is the BBS and is owned and operated by a entirely separate group of people, i.e., Robert Byrd and Eric Brewer and NOT by SBUG. All assets of SBUG-80 belong to SBUG-80 and are NOT part of SBUG. If any member of SBUG wants an accounting of SBUG-80, they should address a request to SBUG-80, not SBUG. If SBUG-80 has gone defunct and their no longer is anyone responsible for SBUG-80, then I would assume that All Sbug-80 Assets, if any, would become the property of the Sbug-80 investors: Eric and Rob. Now, if SBUG wants a BBS and SBUG-80 is no longer, then Sbug should make arrangements to provide the necessary funds, equipment, and resources to make this possible. Also, there is a question of those who paid a \$25.00 life time fee for the use of Sbug-80's BBS. To them, I suggest that they have lost their fee (if Sbug-80 is defunct).
